Breakthrough Project for Social Justice (BPSJ), a community-based nonprofit, was formed in 1998

after a cross-burning at Tokay High and distribution of KKK fliers on Lodi doorsteps. A group of concerned Lodians began working with local police to rid Lodi of racism and intolerance.

For 23 years, BPSJ has held a yearly celebration of Martin Luther King Jr. Day, sponsored scholarships, led discussions, and teamed with Lodi PD to respond to hate crimes with compassion, assistance, and referrals to community services. Our goal is to prevent hate crimes, so we hold essay and art contests to help children think about and learn tolerance.

We are committed to helping every Lodi resident feel safe, accepted, and respected. Our ability to continue our mission depends on community generosity and the work of volunteers. Please lend your support to build a stronger and more inclusive Lodi. And consider joining us to make a difference.



# Featured Performance:

## **Fuse Theatre**

Fuse is dedicated to creating theatre that inspires creative exploration, engages audiences in civic dialogues, and builds stronger communities. Creating accessible theatre is a keystone for the company; working to ensure access through language, cost, and location. We seek ways to incorporate multiple languages, free/low cost ticketing, and accessible neighborhood locations such as community centers, schools, and libraries.

During the past year, Fuse has also taken steps to create a more equitable organizational structure by developing our artist collective, Sparks, and expanding our board membership to diversify the organization. As a theatre company often working with themes of social justice we felt compelled to turn a critical eye inward and shape our future differently.

To prepare for this afternoon, Fuse worked with us to create a unique community performance using a script developed from our student essays.
